10-year-old millionaire, Sarah Rector *by Mary Bell*

Sarah Rector was born in 1902 near the all-black town of Taft, located in the eastern portion of Oklahoma in what was then Indian Territory.

She had five siblings. Her parents, Joseph Rector and his wife, Rose McQueen (both born 1881)were African descendants of the Creek Nation Creek Indians which became part of the Creek Nation after the Treaty of 1866.

The parcel of land allotted to Sarah Rector was located in Glenpool, 60 miles from where she and her family lived. To help cover this expense, in February 1911, Joseph Rector leased Sarah's parcel to the Standard Oil Company.

In 1913, the independent oil driller B.B. Jones drilled a well on the property which produced a "gusher" that began to bring in 2,500 barrels of oil a day. Rector began to receive a daily income of \$300 from this strike.



Don't Be A Statistic - Advocate for Yourself

Doctors prescribe an amazing number of drugs. Roughly a billion prescriptions are dispensed each year. When the average number of pills in a bottle total 30, that is a least 120 billion pills, or over 390 tablets or capsules for every man, woman and child in the United States.



It's no surprise that there are a tremendous amount of problems known in "doctor speak" as adverse drug events, (Ade's). Truth how many people are affected or die from serious drug-induced side effects each year and how many (Ade's) could be prevented.

A prestigious Institute of Medicine reviewed a variety of studies and concluded that at least 1.5 million adverse drug events ("Ade's) occur in the U.S. each year and are preventable, and that the number may even be much higher. Some experts of patient safety have discovered that adverse drug events in primary care practices have as many as 7.8 million (Ade's) could be prevented or ameliorated if patients and their physicians communicated better, and if physicians acted more reliably to address drug medication symptoms.

Most patients trust their physicians, pharmacists, and other care providers. But just like any other endeavor. health care is vulnerable to human error. If we assume that our doctors might make a snap judgment and miss the correct



diagnosis, we might become more assertive in helping them uncover the root cause of adverse drug event symptoms.

Also, drugs themselves can dehydrate the body. This is because many of the side effects of drugs can cause symptoms like diarrhea. And, in the make-up of the drugs themselves, dehydration may just be a usual symptom. Diuretics, antihistamines, blood pressure medication and steroids can all cause the body to be depleted of water. So, when prescribed these drugs, one should intake more water than the usual required amount.

So how much fluid does the average, healthy adult living in a temperate climate need? The National Academies of Sciences, Engineering, and Medicine determined that an adequate daily fluid intake is:

- About 15.5 cups (3.7 liters) of fluids for men
- About 11.5 cups (2.7 liters) of fluids a day for women



These recommendations cover

fluids from water, other beverages and food. About 20 percent of daily fluid intake usually comes from food and the rest from drinks.

Basic Precautions - Ask These Questions

- Is there another method to treat this condition?
- · Will the benefit of this medication prove successful?
- What is the most common side effect?
- What are the most serious side effects?
- What symptoms require immediate attention?
- · How long do I need to take this medication?
- · Should this medication be taken with/without food, morning or evening?
- · Are their special instructions for discontinuing this medication?
- Should this medication be taken morning or evening, with/without food?

Our Responsibility: In a word, we need to be diligent about our responsibility for health and its care. We can trust our care providers to do their best, but we should be ready to do our research. The best doctor/patient relationships are between both participants.
